Workplace violence has emerged as an important safety and health issue in today's workplace. While workplace violence was once confined to a few specific industries, it now affects all businesses of every size and type.

According to a recent Department of Justice national Crime Victimization Survey, assaults and threats of violence against Americans at work number almost two million a year. The most common type of workplace violent crime was simple assault.

As company representatives, it is important for managers and supervisors to be aware of the issues involved in workplace violence and to understand the company's workplace violence prevention plan.
